Nearing the End of the Year

Many of you will be doing a lot of packing as this year comes to a close. Here are a few things to keep in mind...

If you are leaving the district: Print off a copy of MyLearningPlan so you have all your CEUs. Go through all books and materials and make two distinct and separate piles; one stack for personal items and the other for items belonging to the district. If you aren't quite sure ... error on the side of the district. For example, if you wrote curriculum during a summer, but you were paid curriculum rate to produce it, it belongs to the district. That doesn't mean you can't take a copy to use. Next, take the time to clean out cupboards and storage areas. There is nothing worse than moving into a classroom and it's full of someone else's old materials. Do not keep materials from those teachers who came before you. When you leave that classroom be proud of how you left it.

If you are staying in the district: Scan any workshop certificates you have into MyLearning-Plan. Take advantage of any extra time you may have and clean out your cupboards. With construction happening in many buildings, you may have to totally pack up your entire classroom. Be sure to label your boxes as per the district guidelines. 622 Packing & Moving Guidelines Do not feel guilty about tossing those unused items inherited from teachers who came before you. Label all furniture with your room number. If you will have construction in your room or are moving rooms or buildings, take all personal items with you. The district will not move these for you.

History of Teacher Appreciation Week

Teaching is one of the oldest professions - in 561BC, the first private teacher in history was one of the most learned men of all time, Confucius. In Ancient Greece, there was huge value placed on educating children, and in the 1600s the Pilgrims also placed a similar emphasis on the practice. By the 19th century, politicians began to believe that education was needed for political order, and elementary through college education was widespread and public, and the need for teachers has been growing ever since! Though the origins of Teacher Appreciation Week are somewhat murky, it's clear that it was in 1944 that an Arkansas school teacher, Mattye White Woodridge, wrote to politicians and educational professionals about the demand for a day to appreciate teachers. However, it wasn't for nearly a decade until the idea was introduced to Congress by none other than Eleanor Roosevelt. In 1953, she was successful in convincing lawmakers to adopt the day. After the National Education Association (NEA) and Kansas and Indiana state affiliates lobbied Congress again to create National Teacher Day on March 7, 1980, they continued to observe it yearly even though Congress did not. They did this until 1985 when the Assembly transformed the single day into the first full week of May. Teacher Appreciation Day is described by the NEA, which spearheads the weeklong event, as "a day for honoring teachers and recognizing the lasting contributions they make to our lives."
